CANADIAN CHAROLAIS ASSOCIATION ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING JUNE 13, 2015 BRANDON, MB

President's Report

Brent Saunders presented the President's report as circulated. The Association is still in good standing and our numbers are still looking good. Thank you to Office Staff and committees for all their hard work in the past year.

Brent moved his report be accepted as presented.

Brent Saunders asked to have one motion at end of all reports, agreed.

CCA Office Report:

Mel Reekie presented the CCA Office Report as circulated. Mel Reekie provided overview of CCA Association. The Association has been around for 55 years. We have 700+ members and 20,000+ females on Whole Herd Enrollment. Presented data on the Whole Herd numbers per province, registration statistics including polled animals, AI, Coloured, French and ET animals. Gave overview of World Technical Conference being hosted by Canada June 22 to 30, 2015. 58 people from 8 countries are registered to attend. Reviewed SNP DNA testing – 65 Hair Roots for each test at minimum, takes four weeks for results; also reviewed which animals need DNA. Genomics review – CCA is taking conservative approach at this

time. Discussion Re: EPD's – Canada vs USA vs North America evaluations. At this time CCA and AICA have agreed to publish data differently. Raw data still on file, currently use a Limousin base for EPD calculations.

Finance Report

2015 PRESIDENT'S REPORT

2015 was a productive year for the Association, with an increase in the number of registered cattle and progress in several major projects. The Breed Improvement Committee, chaired by Ricky Milton, continues to work with Doug Blair on the development of Genomically Enhanced (GE) EPDs which will improve the accuracy of trait information. The Ad and Promo Committee, led by Andre Steppler, has modernized and added to our marketing strategy, including using social media to increase the exposure of our Canadian Charolais both nationally and around the world. At the same time, the Education Youth Export Committee, led by Darwin Rosso, is creating an updated export brochure to enhance international outreach. Finally, the Market Development Committee chaired by Travis Foot undertook a review of the National Show Guidelines and adopted an updated version. The Association continues to be on solid financial ground coming out of 2015, with more detailed information provided in Brent Saunders' enclosed Financial Committee report. Thank you to all of the committee chairs for their hard work and dedication.

Our GM, Mel Reekie, and Manager of Registry and DNA, Lois Chivilo, were also very busy working on enhancements to the registry system in the hopes of making it more user friendly. All of our staff deserve recognition for the excellent work they do for the Association and its members, including our book keeper Rita Ricioppo.

The 2015 National Show and sale, held at the Canadian Western Agribition, saw a phenomenal turnout in terms of the cattle competing and an incredible sale average. We had a well attended Annual General Meeting in Brandon Manitoba last June. 'Friendly Manitoba' once again lived up to its moniker. Canada hosted the 2015 World Charolais Technical Conference. Thank you to the Mel and office staff who helped organize these excellent events, and to the Charolais Banner for organizing farm tours and events and supporting the CCA.

As a breed, Charolais is strong and will continue strong, even as the industry appears to be heading towards a correction. Sales figures for Charolais bulls and females were strong through 2015 and we look forward to a successful 2016 for the breed.

CCA OFFICE REPORT

What a time to be a Charolais breeder! As we look back on 2015, there are a number of highlights. The growing enthusiasm through 2014 continued and as markets saw corrections, the Purebred Charolais sales held strong.

The Association saw an eye-catching increase to Whole Herd Enrollments with an additional 1500+ active females over 2014. Memberships saw a slight increase; the take home message is that our Charolais breed is on solid footing. Our product is desired and in demand.

With thanks to By Livestock, the World Charolais Technical Conference will remain a highlight of 2015 for many years to come. Fifty-nine participants from nine countries spanning the globe were treated to Canadian hospitality throughout Western Canada that didn't disappoint. It was clear through enthusiasm and interest that our Canadian genetics are sought after because they are of the highest quality; record sales of Canadian Charolais seed stock were realized.

The Canadian Charolais Youth Association (CCYA) Conference and Show held in Yorkton, SK had a strong attendance exceeding that of the last few years. Youth, cattle and enthusiasm were a plenty – there were even young recruits from other breeds joining in on the excitement that our breed has to offer!

It's clear that the future of our breed is in good hands. Reading through the inspiring messages and getting a first hand look at the next generation of Charolais Leaders through their Scholarship applications was a true pleasure. The strength of the leadership skills, the involvement with the breed and their respective communities is remarkable. We received a significant number of highly qualified applicants for the 2015 Scholarships that included youth from commercial operations and purebred breeders from across Canada.

The 2015 National Show and Sale in Regina, SK at Canadian Western Agribition was a celebrated event with participation from members across the country. Hats off to the SCA for organizing the National events. The National Sale averaged close to \$10,000 and we raised \$6000 for our Scholarship program with a generous art donation from Ron Kletzel. The Charolais buzz in the barn carried right through to the RBC Beef Supreme Challenge. Charolais was well represented with four entries in the Top 10 Finalists with McLeod Livestock's PZC TR DESIRAE 012 and calf at side CML DESIRAE 558C crowned Supreme Champion Female.

The Association is driven by our members, we encourage you if not already, to get involved – there's no better time than now! Continue to share the Canadian Charolais story – Be Identifiable – USE CHAROLAIS!

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (unaudited)

1. Nature of operations

Canadian Charolais Association (the "Association") was formed for the encouragement, development and regulation of the breeding of Charolais cattle in Canada. It is incorporated under the Federal Animal Pedigree Act which imposes rules of conduct on the Association and its members acting as purebred livestock breeders.

The Association is dependent on its members to continue as a going concern. The Association is a not-for-profit organization under the Income Tax Act and as such is exempt from corporate income taxes.

The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the Association, Canadian Charolais Holdings Ltd., a wholly owned subsidiary, and Canadian Charolais Youth Fund, a charity controlled by the Association. Canadian Charolais Holdings Ltd. is inactive.

2. Basis of presentation

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles, specifically Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations ("ASNFPO").

3. Significant accounting policies

(a) Cash equivalents

The Association considers all investments with maturities of three months or less and demand bank loans that are utilized periodically for day to day operations to be cash equivalents.

(b) Measurement uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent liabilities at the statements of financial position date and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the year. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

3. Significant accounting policies, continued

(c) Property and equipment and publishing rights

Property and equipment and publishing rights are recorded at cost. The Association provides for amortization using the following methods at rates designed to amortize the cost of the property and equipment and publishing rights over their estimated useful lives. A full year of amortization is recorded in the year of acquisition. No amortization is recorded in the year of disposal. The annual amortization rates and methods are as follows:

Building 4% declining balance
Furniture and equipment 20% declining balance
Property improvements 20% declining balance
Computer equipment 45% declining balance
Computer software 20% declining balance
Publishing rights 5 year straight-line

The Association records a write-down when property and equipment no longer has any long-term service potential to the Association and its net carrying amount exceeds it residual value. The excess net carrying amount over residual value is recognized as an expense in the statement of operations. Previous write-downs are not reversed.

(d) Revenue recognition

The Association follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions.

Revenue from female enrollment and memberships is recognized on a calendar basis in the period to which it relates, and excludes fees collected on behalf of provincial associations. Amounts received from members in advance for the following year are included in deferred revenue.

Rental revenues are recognized each month as the rent becomes due.

DNA revenue is recognized when the lab results are delivered to the member.

Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred.

Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Contributions to the scholarship fund and investment income earned thereon are deferred net of scholarships awarded.

Investment income is recognized in the month it is earned.

(e) Measurement of financial instruments

The Association initially measures its financial assets and liabilities at fair value.

The Association subsequently measures all its financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost, except for marketable investments and restricted investments that are quoted in an active market, which are measured at fair value. Changes in fair value are recognized in the statement of operations in the period incurred.

Financial assets measured at amortized cost include cash, grants receivable and accounts receivable.

Financial liabilities measured at amortized cost include accounts payable and accrued liabilities.

Impairment

Financial assets measured at amortized cost are tested for impairment when there are indicators of impairment. The amount of the write-down is recognized in the statement of operations. The previously recognized impairment loss may be reversed to the extent of the improvement, directly or by adjusting the allowance account, provided it is no greater than the amount that would have been reported at the date of the reversal had impairment not been recognized previously. The amount of the reversal is recognized in the statement of operations.

(f) Contributed materials and services

The Association records the value of contributed materials and services when the fair value can be reasonably estimated and when the materials and services are used in the normal course of the Associations operations and would otherwise have been purchased.

4. Marketable investments

Marketable investments consist of mutual funds and trust units which are valued at fair market value.

5. Restricted assets and deferred contributions

Restricted assets and deferred contributions relate to cash held for a scholarship fund, including reinvested dividends and interest earned on the cash and investments in mutual funds. The deferred contributions are externally restricted and held by the Association for scholarships for members of the Canadian Charolais Youth Association.

9. Financial instruments

The Association's use of financial instruments and its exposure to risks associated with such instruments arises out of its normal course of operations and investing activities.

Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk that one party will cause a financial loss for the other party by failing to discharge an obligation. The Association is exposed to credit risk on the accounts receivable from its members, who are in the agricultural industry. However, the Association has a significant number of members, which minimizes concentration of credit risk.

Market risk

The Association is exposed to the risk that the fair value of its marketable investments and restricted investments that bear interest at a fixed rate will fluctuate because of changes in the market rate of interest.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Association will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. This risk is mitigated by the significant amount of marketable investments held by the Association.

10. Contributed materials and services

The Board of Directors volunteer their time to attend board meetings and represent the Association at events. Members also volunteer their time to organize and operate the provincial associations and represent the Association at events. Due to the difficulty of determining the fair value of volunteer hours, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

BREED IMPROVEMENT COMMITTEE

There are two main initiatives relating to breed improvement currently being pursued by the Canadian Charolais Association both related to eventual implementation of genomically enhanced EPDs(GEPDs).

We are currently engaged with the University of Georgia who is analyzing our data set to identify the important markers related to the traits reported in our current EPDs. This process has seen its share of challenges but with the help of Doug Blair, who continues to work for us as a consultant on implementing genomics, and Sean McGrath's efforts modifying our data set it appears some of those challenges have been resolved.

The second initiative involves our commitment to a residual feed intake (RFI) research project at the University of Alberta research farm in Kinsella. They are breeding their 125 purebred Charolais cows to AI sires and following the steer calves and heifer calves not retained for the breeding herd through their feedlot (equipped with the Growsafe system to measure individual feed intakes). They are genomic testing the animals involved in the trial and gather the carcass data from slaughter with the goal of identifying the important gene markers related to RFI and carcass traits. It is necessary to have at least 1000 records to be able to implement GEPDs for carcass traits and the Kinsella researchers currently have about 830 records to date and should definitely surpass the 1000 threshold by project end.

AD and PROMO

The Ad and Promo Committee had another busy year in 2015, promoting and advertising the Charolais breed through several different avenues. The committee is responsible for all print advertising, on line advertising, social media campaigns, the website, promo items, and additional sponsorships.

Print

Several ads were created in the 2015 year with several more to date. Twelve different ads were published in high traffic magazines such as *The Cattleman, Charolais Banner*, Quebec's *Direction Des Publication Charolais, Simmental Country, Todays Herefords, Angus Advantage*, and the 2015 calendar. Three different design companies have been hired to generate ads for us, enabling us to tap into different design styles and advertising opportunities. We used two different ad types: testimonials and generic. The more popular testimonial ads include" I'm Back", "Universal Breed", and "When Pounds Matter". The following generic ads gave multiple use ad opportunities- "It works!", "Join the Revolution", and "Be Identifiable. Several hours, even days are put into making these ads work.

Online

The on line advertising campaign, new for 2015, only started at the end of the year. It has been carried into 2016 with promising results. Two ads were put on the websites TEAM livestock and DLMS. A banner ad was created for the TEAM website and the "Join the Revolution" ad was converted and used on the DLMS site. When viewers click on the ad, they are forwarded to the Charolais website.

Website

The maintenance and updates on the website are again the responsibility of the Ads and Promo Committee. We have implemented several changes to the website providing membership more avenues to market their product. We have added the "Why Charolais Tab", "Events Page", and an updated Breeder's Link. We had a disconnect with commercial producers when they visited the website. We didn't have the right media to capture their interests in Charolais or the right channels to direct them to a product. Now when viewers click on line advertising, they are directed to the Why Charolais Tab which includes our latest print ads highlighting benefits of using Charolais; a link directs viewer to the Breeders' link, and they also gain access to the upcoming events. The header on the main page also has the breeders' link, upcoming events, history, etc.

Social Media

The social media campaign has been a very exciting, fast pace advertising venue. We use Twitter and Facebook. I head up the Twitter account and Mel heads the Facebook account. Each of these platforms provides an excellent way to capture the younger audience and gets people involved in the "story of Charolais". The main focus is to highlight the Charolais breed

by not only sharing Charolais accomplishments but also elevating Charolais breeder profiles. This is achieved by retweeting, sharing, or liking what the PB and commercial producers are saying. I have found that through these platforms a Charolais family is formed. Updates, events, event details, and deadlines are also easily communicated. And the best part is that this form of advertising only costs us the time to tweet and share.


Promo Items





Alberta & British Columbia Provincial Report 2015

In June 2015, the ACA was pleased to host a field day as part of the World Technical Conference in Bowden; AB. Breeders from across the province were invited to bring cattle to the event and were able to network with Charolais Breeders across the world. Our genetics proved to be in hot demand as several semen interest deals were completed and we opened the eyes of many with our solid red factor genetics. The tour concluded with a tour of McLeod Livestock the following day. We are confident the attendees left with a new appreciation for our beautiful province, our cattle, and the role of Charolais genetics in the Canadian Cattle Industry.

'Synergy' was held once again as it is every year in Olds in coordination with the 4-H Provincial Heifer Show and the Calgary Stampede. Charolais youth were again strongly represented in this premier youth event in 2015, and we will see the CCYA Conference tied into the 2016 show. We welcome all youth members to attend this great show and network with youth from our great breed as well as other breeds in July.

Olds played host to the Fall Classic show which is the kick off to the fall show season in early October. Despite being held when many were still busy harvesting crops, numbers were up overall and the Charolais division had a strong representation including cattle from 3 provinces.

Farmfair International in Edmonton saw resurgence in 2015, with overall numbers up over 33%. Traffic in the barns was steady throughout the week with many International guests attending the show and adding genetics to their respective countries.
