2020 GENERAL MANAGER - OFFICE REPORT

What a year 2020 was, I cannot help but to think of all the events and activities that were postponed or canceled completely. We all had to change the way we do business and the way we went about our day-to-day life. January and February of 2020 were the last time we saw a normal life without restrictions. The early bull sales were strong and were conducted as usual, but when March 15th hit and the restrictions were put in place, a lot of breeders were scrambling and uncertain of how they would hold their bull sales. There were a lot of sleepless nights plagued with worry, but breeders adapted and put together one of the best sale seasons that the Canadian Charolais breed has ever had. Congratulations to all breeders for showing just how resilient you are.

2020 was a very busy and productive year for the Board and staff of the CCA, implementing and completing several new programs and initiatives. In February, the first Residual Feed Intake trial on replacement heifers took place at Lakeland College in Vermillion, AB. The first intake consisted of 51 heifers from one producer. The second intake of heifers took place in the fall, and we had 35 heifers tested, from 7 producers belonging to 3 different provinces. Plans are underway for the next intake this fall, and for more information please contact the CCA office. The Breed Improvement Committee also implemented the "Dam of walking sire 50K test," which had a lower response than we had hoped, still provided us with valuable data, and was well worth the investment. The conversation continues with the American International Charolais Association (AICA) on the joint EPD evaluation, and we hope that the decision will be made soon. A beta run EPD test is also being conducted at International Genetic Solutions (IGS) to explore the possibility of more frequent EPD runs. We continue to make small changes to the registry system to help improve efficiency in the office and for the breeders.


The Ad and Promo committee continues to be aggressive in their advertising campaigns. We have a contract for the back cover of the Canadian Cattleman magazine, and we place seasonal ads in other breed publications. We have increased our presence on our social media platforms and Haylea has recently completed an online course in marketing and social media strategies to aid in further social media efforts. The committee is always looking for high-res photos for ads, so please send them in or if you have customers with those great Charolais influenced calves let me know and we can arrange to get out and get some pictures.

2020 FINANCIAL REPORT:

As you look at the 2020 Financial statement you will see the Canadian Charolais Association (CCA) has had a very prosperous year due to Covid-19. As finance chairman I would like to take this opportunity to highlight a few points.

The financial statement shows that the CCA made an excess of \$313,529.00 in 2020.

It is important to understand that \$123,196.00 of that total is unrealized gain of our investments. What is unrealized gain? Unrealized gain is a potential profit that exists on paper, resulting from an investment. It is an increase in the value of an asset that is yet to be sold for cash. In this world of Covid times we qualified for an assistance program which amounted to \$57,905.00.

As our investment did very well, we had an excess of \$247,710.00 just from these 3 lines of the statement. But we cannot count on them every year in our budget as have no control over them.

Looking at the budget areas of the financial statement you will see that we had a \$65,819.00 excess from unused budgets due to Covid-19. Most of that was unused travel budget from the General Manager, travel to and from meetings for directors, and the absence of an Annual General Meeting.

Your Board of Directors were very close in their proposed budget for 2020, if you take away the four major excess lines.

In November, the board made the decision to invest up to \$120,000.00 of the major excess due to Covid-19. This investment is so each member could contribute to enhancing the EPD numbers for the improvement of the Charolais Breed.

Independent Practitioner's Review Engagement Report



To the Members of Canadian Charolais Association:

We have reviewed the accompanying consolidated financial statements of Canadian Charolais Association that comprise the consolidated statement of financial position as at December 31, 2020, and the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Consolidated Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these consolidated financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of consolidated financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Practitioner's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express a conclusion on the accompanying consolidated financial statements based on our review. We conducted our review in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements, which require us to comply with relevant ethical requirements.

A review of consolidated financial statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements is a limited assurance engagement. The practitioner performs procedures, primarily consisting of making inquiries of management and others within the entity, as appropriate, and applying analytical procedures, and evaluates the evidence obtained.

The procedures performed in a review are substantially less in extent than, and vary in nature from, those performed in an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion on these consolidated financial statements.

Conclusion

Based on our review, nothing has come to our attention that causes us to believe that the consolidated financial statements do not present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Canadian Charolais Association as at December 31, 2020, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Other Matter

The consolidated financial statements of Canadian Charolais Association for the year ended December 31, 2019 were reviewed by another firm of Chartered Professional Accountants, who expressed an unmodified conclusion on those statements on June 29, 2020.

1. Nature of the organization

Canadian Charolais Association (the "Association") was formed for the encouragement, development and regulation of the breeding of Charolais cattle in Canada. It is incorporated under the Federal Animal Pedigree Act which imposes rules of conduct on the Association and its members acting as purebred livestock breeders.

The Association is a not-for-profit organization under the Income Tax Act and as such is exempt from corporate income taxes.

The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the Association and Canadian Charolais Youth Fund, a charity controlled by the Association.

2. Significant accounting policies

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for profit organizations set out in Part III of the CPA Canada Handbook - Accounting, as issued by the Accounting Standards Board in Canada.

Cash

Cash includes cash on hand and cash on deposit, net of cheque's issued and outstanding at report date. Cash subject to restrictions that prevent its use for current purposes is included in restricted cash.

Capital assets

Purchased capital assets are recorded at cost. Contributed capital assets are recorded at fair value at the date of contribution plus all costs directly attributable to the acquisition.

Amortization is provided using the methods below at rates intended to amortize the cost of assets over their estimated useful lives.

Revenue recognition

The Association follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Revenue from female enrollment and memberships is recognized on a calendar basis in the period to which it relates, and excludes fees collected on behalf of provincial associations.

Amounts received from members in advance for the following year are included in deferred revenue.

Rental revenues are recognized each month as the rent becomes due.

DNA revenue is recognized at the time payment is received, which closely corresponds to when the lab results are delivered to the member.

Contributions to the scholarship fund and restricted investment income is recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred.

Unrestricted investment income is recognized as revenue when earned.

2.Significant accounting policies (Continued from previous page)

Financial instruments

The Association recognizes its financial instruments when the Association becomes party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument. All financial instruments are initially recorded at their fair value, including financial assets and liabilities originated and issued in a related party transaction with management. Financial assets and liabilities originated and issued in all other related party transactions are initially measured at their carrying or exchange amount in accordance with Section 3840 Related Party Transactions.

At initial recognition, the Association may irrevocably elect to subsequently measure any financial instrument at fair value. The Association has not made such an election during the year.

The Association subsequently measures investments in equity instruments quoted in an active market and all derivative instruments, except those designated in a qualifying hedging relationship, at fair value. Fair value is determined by published price quotations. Investments in equity instruments not quoted in an active market, are subsequently measured at cost less impairment. All other financial assets and liabilities are subsequently measured at amortized cost.

Transaction costs and financing fees directly attributable to the origination, acquisition, issuance or assumption of financial instruments subsequently measured at fair value are immediately recognized in the excess of revenues over expenses for the current period. Conversely, transaction costs and financing fees are added to the carrying amount for those financial instruments subsequently measured at cost or amortized cost.

Financial asset impairment:

The Association assesses impairment of all of its financial assets measured at cost or amortized cost. The Association groups assets for impairment testing when there are indicators of impairment. When there is an indication of impairment, the Association determines whether it has resulted in a significant adverse change in the expected timing or amount of future cash flows during the year. If so, the Association reduces the carrying amount of any impaired financial assets to the highest of: the present value of cash flows expected to be generated by

holding the assets; the amount that could be realized by selling the assets; and the amount expected to be realized by exercising any rights to collateral held against those assets. Any impairment, which is not considered temporary, is included in current year excess of revenues over expenses.

The Association reverses impairment losses on financial assets when there is a decrease in impairment and the decrease can be objectively related to an event occurring after the impairment loss was recognized. The amount of the reversal is recognized in the excess of excess in the year the reversal occurs.

Government assistance

Claims for assistance under various government grant programs are recorded either as revenue, or a reduction in the related expense account in the year in which eligible expenditures are incurred.

Contributed materials

Contributions of materials are recognized both as contributions and expenses in the statement of operations when a fair value can be reasonably estimated and when the materials are used in the normal course of the Association's operations and would otherwise have been purchased.

Due to the difficultly of determining the fair value of volunteer hours, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

2.Significant accounting policies (Continued from previous page)

Measurement uncertainty

The preparation of consolidated financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period.

Accounts receivable are stated after evaluation as to their collectability and an appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts is provided where considered necessary. Amortization is based on the estimated useful lives of capital assets.

By their nature, these judgments are subject to measurement uncertainty, and the effect on the consolidated financial statements of changes in such estimates and assumptions in future years could be material. These estimates and assumptions are reviewed periodically and, as adjustments become necessary they are reported in excess of revenues over expenses in the years in which they become known. Amortization is based on the estimated useful life's of property, plant and equipment.

5. Restricted assets and deferred contributions

Restricted assets and deferred contributions relate to cash held for a scholarship fund, including reinvested dividends and interest earned on the cash and investments in marketable securities. The deferred contributions are externally restricted and held by the Association for scholarships for members of the Canadian Charolais Association.

6. Government Assistance

During the year, the Company recognized \$57,905 in Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy ("CEWS") and Temporary Wage Subsidy ("TWS") as other income. introduced in response to the COVID-19 (a.k.a. coronavirus) pandemic, provide eligible employers with a subsidy to cover a portion of wage costs paid to eligible employees during prescribed claim periods. There are no unfulfilled conditions related to amounts recognized. However, amounts claimed under these programs are subject to validation and detailed verification by the Federal Government.

7. Financial instruments

The Association, as part of its operations, carries a number of financial instruments. It is management's opinion that the Association is not exposed to significant interest, currency,

credit, liquidity or other price risks arising from these financial instruments except as otherwise disclosed.

Credit concentration

Financial instruments that potentially subject the Association to concentrations of credit risk consist primarily of trade accounts receivable. Accounts receivable from three customers (2019 - two customers) represents 43% (2019 - 46%) of the total accounts receivable. The Association believes that there is no unusual exposure associated with the collection of these receivables. The Association performs regular credit assessments of its customers and provides allowances for potentially uncollectible accounts receivable.

Market risk

The Association is exposed to risk that the fair value of its marketable investments and restricted investments will fluctuate because of changes of public markets.

8. Significant event

The recent outbreak of the coronavirus, also known as "COVID-19", has spread across the globe and is impacting worldwide economic activity. Conditions surrounding the coronavirus continue to rapidly evolve and government authorities have implemented emergency measures to mitigate the spread of the virus. The outbreak and the related mitigation measures may have an adverse impact on the global economic conditions as well as on the Association's business activities. The extent to which the coronavirus may impact the Association's business activities will depend on future developments, such as the ultimate geographic spread of the disease, the duration of the outbreak, and the effectiveness of actions taken in Canada and other countries to contain and treat the disease. These events are highly uncertain and as such, the Association cannot determine if there will be any financial impact at this time.



2020 BREED IMPROVEMENT REPORT:

The 2020 Breed Improvement committee members include: Kasey Phillips (Chairperson) Shawn Airey, (Co-Chairperson) Allan Marshall, Jim Olson, Roger Maloney, Rod Mcleod, Aaron Grant, Doug Blair, Denis Serhienko.

We completed two Feed Efficiency trials in 2020 at Lakeland College in Vermilion AB. A total of 86 heifers were tested in 2020 with both a spring and fall intake. Both groups were successful in reaching their target weights, and these trials have provided valuable data for the association. We would like to thank the breeders for their participation in this trial.

Each time the committee meets, we discuss possible programs that will benefit, the breed, the members, and the association. One of the discussions included providing 50K's (now 100K) on the dams of walking sires. We implemented a program where members get a free 50K test on their walking sires' dam, when they 50K that walking sire. This program was pertinent to all membership and provided the association with significant genetic data.

We introduced more EPD evaluations this year, increasing the number of evaluations from two per year, to six. This allows producers to have the most up to date genomic information on their animals come sale time and allows for more opportunity to be a part of the evaluation. We now have over 8000 genomic records that go into our evaluations. We are still in discussion with the American International Charolais Association (AICA) regarding a joint evaluation. We continue to keep the conversation rolling and hope to have new information soon. We are currently using AGI as our EPD evaluation provider, and we were able to secure a better rate with the additional EPD runs. Our cost is now in line with the AICA and will be similar if the joint evaluation materializes.

100K testing and genomic data continue to be an important part of the Breed Improvement committee's focus, as we know more genomic records give the breed more tools and opportunity to lead in the industry. We encourage everyone to test as many animals as possible. We are looking forward to 2021 and seeing some of the new programs we have discussed be introduced.

Any requests or new ideas from the membership are always appreciated and welcomed.

2020 AD & PROMO REPORT:





2020 CANADIAN CHAROLAIS YOUTH ASSOCIATION REPORT:

The CCYA has very little to report this year, as we did not hold our annual conference and show in Olds, Alberta as was planned, due to the global pandemic. The National Board and the 2020 CCYA planning committee decided that it was the responsible decision to postpone the conference until 2021. The National Board members remained unchanged this year and we decided to allow members in their final year of eligibility the opportunity to participate for one more year in the 2021 conference.

The 2021 CCYA Conference and Show will be held in Olds, Alberta in conjunction with Summer Synergy from July 13-16. The show will be run under the most current COVID-19 guidelines provided by the AHA to ensure the safest outcomes for all participants and guests. As of right now, we are not expecting to have to limit the number of participants able to participate in the show, however there will be several changes made to some of the events and general happenings of the week to ensure everyone's safety and abide by the most up to date rules. We are very excited to be going ahead with the 2021 conference in some capacity and providing an opportunity for Charolais Youth to learn and do what they love. The National Board decided not to carry over 2020 memberships to 2021, however this year's membership fee will be \$20 for the year and will not increase to \$40 after January 1st as per usual.

Our fundraising this year was somewhat less than usual, as our expenses were significantly less without a conference. We did host our Annual Semen Auction at the Super Star Sale in Saskatoon in November 2020, which was a great success, raising \$8425. We decided to cancel our Facebook Fundraising Auction, which was scheduled for February 2021, as we felt it was unnecessary without our usual expenses in 2020.

Although the CCYA did not hold a Conference and Show in 2020, we did run all of our other programs as usual. Youth submitted essays in our annual essay competition, and applied for semen from the Genetics Program, as well as rebates from the Purchase Incentive program. As expected, our Buy and Show program was less utilized this year due to the very few numbers of shows being held, but it was great to see youth taking advantage of the other great programs offered by the CCYA.

In closing, we would like to extend our gratitude to the CCA for their continued support of Charolais youth through their sponsorship of our conference and programs. The annual \$5000 sponsorship goes a long way in helping with conference and program expenses throughout the year, and in return, the CCA is recognized as the highest level of sponsorship at each conference. 

Whole Herd Enrollment





2020 ALBERTA & BRITISH COLUMBIA PROVINCIAL ASSOCIATION REPORT:

Demand for Charolais genetics in 2020 soared and helped seedstock producers deal with the challenges they faced in the year no one will soon forget. The AB/BC Board grew to include 13 Directors and 3 CCA Directors in 2020 representing Alberta and British Columbia.

The Board reconvened in early February and re-evaluated its focus and direction for the upcoming year. Committees were formed and budgets set for the upcoming year. Little did we know in February that 2020 was going to be a year like no other anyone had experienced.

We continued to showcase the breed at Bull Congresses in Camrose, Stettler, Oyen, Dawson, and Czar in early 2020. Momentum for the breed was evident with strong demand for Charolais bulls and information at our booth. Bull sales started strong early in February. Covid made for some very scary and unprecedented measures for sales in March as breeders were faced with crowd limits, health restrictions and uncertainty. Many relied heavily on technology and adapted by marketing via videos and internet sales versus more traditional in-person events.

Unfortunately, we had come to the realization that a summer tour was impossible for the ACA to host in the summer of 2020. With the public health restrictions in place, uncertainty and liability risk to the association we decided to postpone the tour until 2021. As the summer progressed, the CCYA show which was to be held with Summer Synergy, Olds Fall Classic and FarmFair International were all postponed as well until 2021. This was a disappointment for many breeders as marketing opportunities were limited. Restrictions at Auction Marts also meant special "Charolais influenced calf sales" and other related breed supported events were also postponed until the Covid situation improved and public health orders adjusted. We look forward to 2021 and hopefully a return to normalcy where we can support and promote our breed at these events.

As the summer progressed, it looked as if our signature event "The AB Select Bull Show and Select Female Sale" along with our Annual Meeting would be able to be held in December. The Board worked very hard and partnered with a company called Crowd Design to help us sort through the restrictions and ensure we hosted a safe event for everyone. After several changes to health protocols and restrictions leading up to the event including a time where we were unsure if we could even host the event, our team worked closely with Alberta Health Services and the Westerner in Red Deer and received an exemption to host a scaled down version of the event. The Annual Meeting, group meals and the Bull Show was not considered 'essential' and therefore could not be included in the 2020 version of the AB Select. To help our breeders promote their bull calves, we enhanced our video coverage and hosted a "parade" of bull calves that was streamed via the internet and was very well received. We allowed any 4-H AB or BC member exhibiting a Char influenced animal in 4-H in 2020 the opportunity to utilize their \$1000 sale credit for both online purchases and/or in person at the event. The sale continued to be one of the highest averaging sales in the country! Our partner Crowd Design registered everyone coming into the event, temperature checked everyone entering, disbursed ACA face coverings and ensured everyone entering the facility signed a waiver to protect the association from liability. The ACA was very proud of the event we put on given the circumstances and looks forward to 2021 where we can incorporate some of our new ideas to continue to grow the event even further!

Congratulations to all our award recipients this year –Purebred Breeder of the Year – Turnbull Charolais, Booster of the Year – Innisfail Auction Mart, Commercial Breeder of the Year – Sunderland Farms, Pioneer Award – Harold and Tish Fieldberg and our scholarship winners Kailey Wirsta (Lakeland College), Kendall Prokuda (SAIT) and Reegan McLeod (University of Saskatchewan). We look forward to officially presenting these awards when the Covid restrictions are eased.

The continued utilization of social media and our website helped us drive our message and engage those interested. Over 1100 members currently are subscribed to our Facebook account. Nominations for our 4 awards through our website had an excellent response from various breeders in Alberta/BC and also allowed students to easily apply for scholarships online.

Check out the website at www.albertacharolais.com if you have not already. I wish to thank the entire Board for their hard work, dedication, and creativity throughout this challenging year. The ACA looks forward to 2021 as we enter our 62nd year and continuing to grow and strengthen the Charolais breed!
